## RIVER ROYALTY by Mike Hansen

It was shortly after the third night of our annual fly fishing weekend, where we had sat around a campfire feasting on freshly caught Brown Trout, wild leeks and Morel Mushrooms that the guys had harvested in the Clifton Hollow, that the term "River Royalty" was first introduced into my vocabulary. A friend of mine who owns an amazing home on the Kinnickinnic River, which we rented once or twice a year, commented that a meal like that was: "fit for River Royalty." River Royalty. Hmmm. If there is such a people, such a clan, tribe, family — I would be honored to belong to it. River Royalty.

If there is such a clan, and I have a hunch there is, I believe them to be fly-fishermen (women); and to take it one step further — fly fishermen who passionately pursue the art and science of outsmarting the wily Trout in their natural surroundings using a fly rod and tiny hooks wrapped with animal hair and bird feathers, thread and whatever else one might think to wrap around it. Fly fishermen mind you, of every race, creed, gender, economic status, age and skill level, each and every one with a fly rod and artificial flies, seeking to outwit the elusive trout.

Each and every member of River Royalty, if there be such a family, has their own unique story. For instance: when and how were you first introduced to fly rods, fly casting, rivers, streams and little hooks wrapped with animal hair and feathers? What was the first river you waded into as you began your personal pursuit of native trout? Did you land any? Or, was it miles of wading and thousands of casts before you outsmarted and landed and released your first Brown, Brookie, Rainbow or Cutthroat Trout? And why did you pick up that fly rod again, after hours of futile casting, arm pump, knotted tippet and fly line and the agonizing "cracking of the whip" sound followed by the annoying, redundant "ten and two" reminder of your mentor as he/she coached you from the sidelines. What kept you coming back with a fly rod in your hand after investing hours and hours on the river with no return for your investment, when you knew damn well that if you had a Folgers coffee can loaded with night crawlers you could have filled your creel. And how many nymphs, dry flies and streamers did

you sacrifice to the "river gods"? How many re-ties, and new tippet, and torn or worn out waders, and fly rods did you contribute to the cause? How many mosquito bites, tick bites, burning nettle rash, blood, sweat and tears were shed?

Were these experiences — difficult and painful as they were — perhaps the baptism into *River Royalty?* Were they perhaps the *passage of rites* every member of *River Royalty* must go through to enter the clan?

So — when did you begin to dream about being in the river with a fly rod in your hand? While at work, family gatherings, church, business meetings, lunch breaks? And when did it happen that you, and other members of *River Royalty* began to

scheme and dream and plan and schedule times when you could be together on a river somewhere, with a fly rod in your hand, casting little hooks wrapped with animal hair and feathers in an attempt to outsmart the wily Trout?

And when did the woods and the rivers finally begin to share some of their secrets and joys with you that

they only share with members of River Royalty; like clusters of Morel mushrooms safely hiding under Burning Nettle bushes, or where the old Trout lies are and what fly would elude them and put them in your net giving you the privilege of releasing them unharmed, back to their lie? And when did the woods and the waters begin to open your ears and your eyes and your nose to her sounds, and sights and smells that only members of River Royalty enjoy? The therapeutic, melodious songs of warblers; stunning sheer vertical rock walls, luscious green overhead canopy of leaves and, if you listen carefully — the very words of God whispered from under the rocks in the riffles.

And when was it that it first happened — you remember the moment — when you first felt as one with it all, while standing there waste deep in the cool moving water: feeling, listening, smelling — being — and not doing.


**Northwest Passage Program** 

KRLT partners with Northwest Passage – providing outdoor experiences for challenged youth.

Northwest Passage (nwpltd.org), a residential facility in Frederic, WI, provides intensive multidisciplinary treatment for boys and girls experiencing significant emotional and behavioral disorders. Using a mix of traditional and forward thinking therapies, Northwest Passage encourages its residents to find healing expression through interacting with the outdoors. With cameras in tow, the young adults of Northwest Passage document and express themselves through images and videos of the woods and waters of northwestern WI.

Throughout the Summer of 2018, the KRLT is working with Northwest Passage, welcoming their residents to make the entire "Kinni" their studio. This unique partnership will provide a one-of-a-kind experience, allowing the residents to witness and record the Kinni as it transforms from a spring pond to a rural – urban – canyon waterway. Expect beautiful photo essays and dramatic underwater videos!

Their photos and personal reflections will be shared with the KRLT, and their work will be displayed for all to see this Fall in River Falls (date TBD) and at the R4F Fly Fishing Festival on March 8, 2019.


#### Scrappy - Saturday, July 14


